

This is how my sketch looks in the beginning:) I use a very loose chalky brush for texture and focus on the shapes and angles.



On a new normal layer, here you can see I'm just focusing on cleaning up the shapes a bit. I'm not using any hard lines or anything because I don't want the mouth to look stiff, just soft brush strokes:)



After that, I change my sketch layer to a bright red shade using Curves. This will make my lines look really vibrant as I paint on top:)



With a multiply layer above that previous layer, I'll paint the skin tone! It's okay if it covers everything including the teeth because we'll brighten those up later.




Then on a new multiply layer, I'll paint a bright pinkish red tone for the lips.
You can use any lip color you'd like for this step:)



Now time to brighten the teeth! I don't ever go stark white because I like a natural look, so I just used a creamy white tone on a Hard Light layer with a round brush.



Now time to start adding some shading to the lips! I do this on a multiply layer and shade where there's shadow on the lips, following the curves with my brush strokes.



To add some extra brightness to the teeth, I like to create an overlay layer and paint just a tiny bit of bright lavender or blue on the teeth with a round brush to create a subtle shine.



And now the best part:
highlights! I'll just add
these on a normal layer
with a bright rosy hue. I
used the Jagged Brush in
procreate and erased the
edges of the brush strokes
to get those sharp edges!

lip highlights:



Before adding highlights, I think it's good to make sure you have a decent base of shadows on the lips first like you can see in this little example:)

Having some deep shadows will contrast against the bright areas of the lips and add lots of depth!





MY FAVORITE COLOR FOR LIP HIGHLIGHTS "

When I add the highlights, I try to choose one side of the lips to create some asymmetrical balance, and I also try not to add too much so I don't overwhelm the drawing. My general approach is to add one big highlight with two smaller ones next to it:) Also make sure to follow the curve of the lips so you emphasize the form too!



After adding those little highlight blobs, I like to use my eraser to erase the edges around the blobs to add sharpness to them:) Try setting your eraser to a round brush or a textured painting brush to get some painterly effects!



After adding those initial highlights, sometimes I like to add some extra color by creating an overlay layer on top and painting a tiny bit of bright pink or red above the highlights to intensify the lighting/shine:)

Then use the same erasing technique on that overlay brushstroke you just made, add any extra detail you'd like, and it's done!
