Syncopation For the Ukulele

Syncopation: Emphasis on the off beat, or the &. Very common, but not exclusive to, reggae and ska music. It can be used in both rhythm, riffing and lead playing.

Rhythm style one - try and mute the strings for a quick muted down up strum on the beat and e and after emphasis the &. To mute both down and up the easiest way is to lay your fingers across the strings, instead of the chucking method.

1 e & a 2 e & a 3 e & a 4 e & a x x D x x D x x D

Take it slow, if you would like to you can also add a mute on the a like this.

1 e & a 2 e & a 3 e & a 4 e & a x x D x x x D x x x D x

Rhythm style two - This is a great rhythm, I give a very slight mute on the 1, 2, 3 and 4. Because there is less action going on this will work better with more musicians. Remember, when you add other instruments you have less responsibility.

1 e & a 2 e & a 3 e & a 4 e & a x D x D x D x D

Rhythm style three - This rhythm is a serious of quick upstrums and sounds best in fast styles like punk rock with syncopation, or ska music.

1 & 2 & 3 & 4 & U U U U

Riff - Slightly modified from the video, the 1 & and have been replaced with a single pluck of the G note on the $3^{\rm rd}$ fret of the E string.

Practice all these techniques, you will be able to throw them in your own song writing in no time, and next time syncopation comes up in a tenthumbs lesson you will nail it!
