Let's begin.

## **ORIGINS**

Before we go to deep into Chris's character, his motivations, and why he believes that grease is a miracle tonic for his hair, let me tell you his past. Cliché to the core and proud of it. His mom was a bit less cliché but frankly, she's not really important when it comes to Chris's story, ouch but what can one do? Cliché as well, right? The biggest figures in Chris's life was his father and his grandfather. Father wise, he loved Chris but there's no doubt that he wanted to live vicariously through Chris. He encouraged Chris to do sports, to get girls and break their heart, he cared about grades but not all that much. He wanted Chris to be everything he wished he could be when he was younger. He was racist, homophobic, xenophobic, and well, sexist. And when the man started drinking then his mouth never stopped running, he was definitely mentally abusive to Chris. So Chris definitely was privy to

every jab that his dad made. He was raised to believe it and would probably be just like his father if it wasn't for his grandfather.

Chris's grandfather was a war veteran in the Vietnam War. He was awarded the Purple Heart and retired. He married his college sweetheart, but it was later found out by Chris that he was gay and had lost his actual lover in the Vietnam War. Chris spent as much time as he could around his grandfather, idolizing the man for his strength, humor, taste in music, and character in general. His grandfather got him into classic rock, encouraged Chris when no one else did and constantly reminded Chris that he was not his father and that his father was wrong on so many things. He goes from simple college student to fugitive on the run with a cambion, a small child like creature, and his best friend. Not to mention that he ends up tortured, traumatized, and almost turns into a cryptid. By the end of season one, Chris isn't exactly comfortable but he's far more comfortable than when he began. The routine to him now is wake up, kill monsters, eat, yell at Sydero, joke on Bradley, go to sleep. Season two throws yet another wrench into this plan, not only is his routine messed up again (also understand he's not used to his routine changing this dramatically, the man spent three years in college doing practically the same thing for goodness sake) but there's new elements. Which brings me to the next point ...
- 2. Chris is **loyal**. Blah if you don't like him, you can't tell me he's not loyal. This is the one point I will argue with all of you over, fight me! Roe is able to make a critical decision in Chris's story in S1-Ep2, get on the bus or tag along ... well that's if he's still alive. If Roe says come with us, then that's the indicator for Chris. If he wasn't loyal then he would've snorted and walked his ass right onto that bus. Now, of course, one would think he'd complain a little less. It's not like he didn't get a great demo of what this life would be like in that motel room, but hey, it's Chris. Roe isn't Chris's first friend, but they were currently his best friend. There is so much Chris would do for Roe, whether rival or friendly. Chris trusts Roe so much that when they say come with us, he goes.

- He'd rather go with Roe because Roe is familiar (of course romance wise it's a bit more than that, but I'll speak more on that in the romance section). And to Chris, he believed that if Roe could survive then so could he ... NEXT POINT!
- 3. Chris was highly unprepared. Unlike Roe, Chris didn't have any childhood memories of strange things, in a way, Roe was already in this life. They were already traumatized and used to seeing things that shouldn't be there. They had both parents' die, a spirit figure that killed them, and remember being pulled down into some dark ass abyss because of it. If he wanted to do it, he did it and he did it well. So why should this life be any different? To Chris, Roe could do it, so why couldn't he? So, every time he freaks out and Roe keeps their cool, Chris is bothered. Every time he was bested, and Roe plays hero, Chris is bothered. Season one is literally Chris being bothered by the fact that he can't do what Roe can, that he's not adapting like Roe does. This bothers the living shit out of him. Why can't he do it! And ...
- 5. Why can't he just be **helpful**? No one wants to be on a team and not contribute, if you do then you're not really on the team. Chris is the weak link; everyone knows it but only Sydero really says it. Everything I stated before is still on Chris's mind, whether he accepts and knows it or not. How much different would it be if Chris entered this life because of something personal like supernaturals killed his parents? Or they directly came after him? He was brought in as a liability at the end of the day, and he knows it.
- 6. And lastly, Chris is handed a golden opportunity to go back to routine and a **sense of normalcy**, and he can't grab it. Remember how I said in season one Chris is struggling to find a rhythm, a routine? Well season two is all about having the temptation of going back to some kind of understanding dangled right in front of him, and not being able to take the bait. Imagine this ... you haven't eaten in days and someone comes along and offers you your favorite food, right there within reach. But the catch is that eating it is death, don't ask me why or how, that's the scenario I gave. Sydero is gone, Raum is gone, Petri and Langston are in the wind. Chris could 100% go back to either a normal life or at least his season one routine of just simple hunting. But what does his team

want to do? They want to travel to hell and get Sydero back. They're going left when his attention is on right. The road to the right has such temptation that it eats at him every second he's walking the other way. Add in the fact that his best friend, the best friend he came into this with is not a human, is something no one knows, and this scares the hell out of him. He's stepping on mines when the path to the right is telling him that if he came over there, he'll be safe. Everyone would be safe.

## **FRIENDSHIP**

I spoke about Chris's loyalty and friendship a bit. I'll try to wrap up any points and things I've seen recently that I might want to clear up.

- He complains too much.
  - Well ... yes, yes, he does. I actually have nothing to say in defense of him for this. He's a complainer, I'd say it's because he thinks things are stupid if he doesn't understand it but for the sake of others, he could do that quietly.
- Chris chose this.
  - Yes, yes, he did, but he did it for Roe. If you don't like Chris then that's you, I'm not upset, in fact I wouldn't want everyone to love him and think him some kind of hero. Having people who despise him and those who love him is great, it means he's human. He decided to stick around and to continue sticking around because of his faith in Roe. Despite them arguing, Roe is Chris's friend and he cares about them.
- Chris treats Roe like crap because they're not human.
  - o I'm on the fence about this one. That's because, yes, Chris is acting differently and putting more space between Roe than when Roe was just human. And if this was realistic and I was Roe and had someone acting towards me the way Chris is, I'd be hurt and pissed off as well. Because, um, fuck you my guy, I just learned that I'm not human too and you're just adding to the bullshit plate.

With that being said, I also, as the writer, know where Chris is coming from. Harder to see with friendship than romance but Chris is not good with emotions. He feels them far too quickly and conveys them far too slow. For a guy that thinks he's all that, he can get pretty tongue tied and lost within his own mind. Chris keeps shit in, because he's trying to sort them out first before presenting to Roe or whomever, a jumbled-up mess. And so, this causes him to give the person the cold shoulder, not really helpful but it's Chris.

Now, imagine this for yourself. Your whole world is not the same, you've seen some fucked up stuff since entering this new world and almost had it swallow you. You don't show it, but you almost turned into an entire cryptid, you're traumatized whether you like it or not. Every supernatural you've met besides one (Faye) is pretty much either a psycho, an asshole, or just plain monstrous. Your best friend has a monster inside of them. A spirit that can bring them to their knees and you can't do shit about it. You can just watch. Now, you learn that that friend is also not human. They're not what's normal to you, they're one of those creatures.

Chris isn't racist?? Is that even the word to use here? Whatever ... He's not prejudice against supernaturals but he's also not the person to advocate for them. And he's definitely not wearing a 'I Love Supernaturals' t-shirt. This is all to say that he's seen and experienced what supernaturals can do, and you're one no one has ever seen. He's terrified, he's not just terrified, he's unsure and he's so far out his comfort zone that he doesn't even know what to do with himself. In season two he sees Roe lose control and he sees even more psycho supernaturals. There is nothing here telling him that this is going to be okay. He's scared for you, himself, and the team.

### **ROMANCE**

The area that you guys probably really care about. So far, this is written with both season one and two in mind. In season three Chris finally takes a turn for the better. This area is to try and explain Chris's attitude and what's going through his mind on a more emotional level ... emotions.

To understand Chris is to understand his past relationships. This is not an excuse but truthfully, Chris doesn't really know what love looks like. His parents didn't love each other, marriage was more of an ideal situation for both of them. His grandfather loved his grandmother but only in the way one would a really good friend. There were no other family members in his life and besides some high school friends ... well we all know that no one has romantic sense in high school, let's be honest. His concept of love mostly came from movies, watching movies that said if you were heroic then the girls would want you. And as the icing on the cake, when Chris did date, he brought most of his questions to his father. The same father that told him that a woman being mean to him or acting hard to get was a woman who wanted him. That encouraged him to have sex and then dump the girl because he was that desirable. The same dad that had no problem calling women 'hoes' or 'bitches. This got even worse when

he no longer had his grandfather to turn to. (Note that this is in no way me saying 'boohoo Chris never knew how to treat people with respect and love.' He's a grown man, he knows right from wrong.)
